RWB Note: The diorama of the "Joyse Phillips" was originally built for James Philips. In 1880 my great grandfather, Eldred Wilks Banfield married Annie Phillips, James's daughter. She (Annie) died in child birth January 1881 and Eldred went on to marry Ellen Farquharson of Penzance, in 1882. 10 days after Annie died, James's wife Joyce died. James Phillips then went on to marry Mary Banfield Farquharson of Penzance, a close relation of Ellen.

When I was a kid I came across the diorama in the attics of our house at Holy Vale, on St. Mary's. I tried, unsuccessfully thank goodness, to tease the model of the cutter out from behind the glass. In later years, and unknown to me, my parents had a clear out and sold some of the 'junk' from the attics to a local antiques shop and with it went the diorama. Moving on to 2009, Adidas came to the Islands with a group of footballers (Gerrard, Beckham etc) to make an advert. The local football club, and the youngsters, were involved with the multi-million pound advert, and after the event I was asked by a couple to convert their video of Beckham etc. down to a DVD. Whilst checking the video I spotted the diorama. The couple were leaving the Islands in a few months and were keen to part with the diorama. I did not need pushing to hand over some money and walk back up the road carrying the diorama. A lucky find!

Following on from the above information the following was received from Roger Steward (13.6.2015) which I have copied across. Viz.

I was intrigued about John Tyrer (shareholder of the "Suffolk" and other vessels). You showed me a photo of the wood carving you have by him of the barque "Joyce Phillips". I have noted what page 64 of "Built on Scilly" says about him and also spotted that he and Mary Tyrer (his mother) both had shares in James Phillip's "Minerva".

Born 24 January 1812 in Portsea Hampshire and baptised St John Portsea 13 Feb 1812 as John Reeves Tyrer, parents George and Mary (misspelt Tyre).



His eldest son was also called John Reeves Tyrer, born in 1848, and also lived at 50 George St. He gained his Second Mates Certificate April 1868 (reissued again in October1872) and First Mate (cert 96664) on 13 November 1872 with 7 years previous service (on Liverpool ships "Savoir Faire" and "Maravilla") and showing him (attached record) as serving as Second Mate from 1870 to 1872 on the "Joyse Phillips"! No wonder his father did your carving of her. No record found of him after 1872 - wonder if he was lost with the ship?

EFFECTS OF THE LATE STORMS. -During a terrific storm the pilot cutter "Atlantic" (RIVB No. 104) was driven from her moorings in the pool at St. Mary's, and became a total wreck on the rocks. On the previous evening the barque "Joyse Phillips", of Scilly, and the smack "Onwards", of Dublin, with part of a cargo of potatoes, were anchored in the Roadstead, and as day dawned on the following morning, it was found that the "Onward" had disappeared, and as nothing could be seen or heard of her in any direction, great fears were entertained for the safety of the vessel and her crew, with whom was a pilot from the shore. Very fortunately, as it appears, about midnight she parted one chain, and a little after 2 a.m. the other parted, when the pilot managed to get her clear of the rocks out to sea, and after being driven to Start, the weather moderated, and she got back to Penzance.
