

ARRIVAL OF TWO IMMIGRANT SHIPS.

A large portion were foreigners, and from them there was no complaint; but the Briton, as usual, must have a grumble. It appears that through some inadvertency during the early part of the voyage provisions were served out according to Haulder Bros' scale, which allows but 3 lbs. of flour to each, instead of 3½ lbs. But as soon as the complaint was made the full allowance was issued. The vessel will be towed into harbor on Thursday, when the people will be open to engagement.
